ies are a temple of God, we begin to notice how we eat and drink as well as the importance of exercise. We will also take note of depression, mood swings, and changes in behavior that may

affect our mind. The practice of spiritual disciplines including prayer, fasting, devotions, rest, and recreation will help us with balance.

Another theme that was emphasized was relationships with others. Many speakers commented on the infighting among church members, conflict in the home, and struggle to live out

the word "on the street." I know that there has been a history of conflict in the church and while I know that hurt, betrayal, and distrust take a long time to heal, we can write new chapters together which will provide new relationships with each

other in the future that will look very different from the ones we had in the past. Division and resentment weaken the church, the family, and most of all, our example as Christians.

"The ultimate measure of a person is not where one stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where one stands at times of challenge and controversy." -- Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

One of our heroes, **Dr. Martin** Luther King, Jr. was a fine example of a person who lived out his faith in the midst of conflict. He stood strong in a place of peace for God, even in times of challenge and controversy. Jesus continued to love even those who persecuted and killed him, because that was who he disciplined himself to be.

May we write a new chapter with God this year and may all of West Philadelphia see the light within us and shine the light that is within themselves.



Report From Finance Ministry

Dear Members,

We are excited and glad to report some of our successes during the year 2006 from your tithes and offerings.

With an annual budget of \$252,219.00 we made 98%. What a blessing! (Compared to 2005, our annual budget was \$258,540.00 and we made 85%). We were able to pay our total Connectional Ministries Commitment of \$10,000.00. (Compared to 2005, our commitment was \$15,000 and we paid \$2,000.00 or 13%).

In December, a plea went out asking the congregation to go an extra mile to meet a budget of \$1,200.00 and our receipts totaled \$1,540.00 or 128%.

This year, we will implement changes so that we

will not have to come to the congregation as often:

- The extra mile giving envelope will be placed in the bulletin on the Second Sunday of each month, beginning in February.
- In your box of envelopes for 2007, is a new one marked, "Higher Utility & Energy Costs, to be applied to the high gas bills.

As always, we ask that you do the best that you can.

In closing, your contribution enables Finance to achieve the financial goals of the church. We thank you and may God continue to bless you.

W. C. WINGATE Speaks

The West Philadelphia Civic League, Raymond Leslie, president, held its monthly forum in CAMPHOR Sunday night. Guest speaker was W. C. Wingate, prominent local business man, who urged his listeners to apply sound business principles in their economic affairs.

Eston C. Collins, Jr., presided. Miss Claribel Gray introduced the speaker, and Mrs. Edna Henderson, of the public relations department of the League, made n appeal for support of the League's program to secure employment of memars of our race group in the city's leading business enterprises.

Joshua Bell, 3rd, led the Young Adult Choir in a beautiful interpretation of the Spiritual favorite, "Steal Away to Jesus." Soloists were, C. Wyatt Graves, violinist, and Mrs. Evelyn Pugh, contralto. Each served also as ipano accompanist to the other.

Mr. Wingate's address will be reviewed in next week's issue of THE LIGHT. Speaking out of his experience, starting from the bottom, and building one of the race's leading business enterprises, he offered helpful suggestions on the principle of racial solidarity.

(Editor's Note: While Mr. Wingate's theory on racial solidarity is sound economically and racially, it must be remembered that as a Christian Church we must encourage cooperation among all peoples to bring about world brotherhood. It is along this line that we will review the address next week and offer a critical analysis by Reese J. Brown, of our staff, as well.).

MORNING SERVICES

A near capacity audience was in attendance at morning worship. The pastor spoke on, "Inwardly, Wolves," and music was led by the Young Adult Choir, Eston Collins, directing. The anthem was, "I'll Never Turn Back," by Dett.
Four persons were received into membership: Mrs. Lillie Brite, Mrs. Emily Jordan, Maurice Grimes and Donald Mayo.
The pastor explained why the Bible speaks frequently of sheep and wolves,

taking his text from the words of Jesus, "Beware of false prophets who come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves."

"The sheep," he said, "is an emblem of Christ, as well as of the people of God. Isaiah tells us that 'Jesus was oppressed and afflicted, yet He opened not His mouth; He is brought as a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before her shearers is dumb, so He openeth not His mouth.' And the psalmist tells us that 'we are the people of His pasture, and the sheep of His hand."

GUEST EDITORIAL

from The Afro-American Newspapers

THE CAMPHOR LIGHT, a weekly newspaper published by CAMPHOR MEMORIAL METHODIST CHURCH, Philadelphia, in an editorial in its current issue, has some frank, straightfrom-the-shoulder talk for its fellow Mathodists Methodists.

Congratulating the Philadelphia Presof the city's colored population, the publication suggests that Philadelphia Methodists "take prayerful note of the Presbyterian effort to do something practical about Christian race relationships."

Then the editorial poses five pertinent

1) Have colored people been admitted;

1) Have colored people been admitted, without prejudice, on application to our Methodist Hospital?
2) Would colored persons be admitted to our Methodist Home for the Aged?
3) Would colored children be welcome to the Methodist Orphanage?
4) Are there colored members in any of our "white" Methodist churches in Philadelphia? (Each pastor might seriously consider what he would do if a half dozen came forward to join his church next Sunday morning!)
5) Would qualified colored persons, if members of "white" churches, be recommended for places of responsibility, such as choir singers, trustees, stewards,

such as choir singers, trustees, stewards, or other office?

As a case in point, the editorial cites a classified advertisement inserted in a daily newspaper three years ago by the Methodist Hospital for a white elevator operator.

operator.

In a few poignant words, the church paper explains that the hospital, being a church institution, ought to square its tenets with its practices.

Speaking as forthrightly as it does, the editorial should cause soul-searching not only among Methodists, but among members of all denominations who should chance to read it. chance to read it.





Camphor Leaders Engaged in "Making Disciples" Training

Approximately 18 members of the Administrative Council attended the first training session of "Making Disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World" held at Tindley Temple UMC on January 12, 2007. The training will continue over the next 18 to 24 months.

In his first Bishop's Day on the District event in October, 2006, **Bishop Marcus Matthews** stated,

"Our mission is to make disciples for Jesus Christ...There is no other purpose for being the church of God."

He then introduced his plan to focus all churches and members of the EPA Conference on "Making Disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World" and set a goal of 10% growth to be attained by year 2012.

Bishop Marcus said he was shocked that membership in the EPA Conference was 125,902 in 2005, down 2,594 from the previous year and that

membership over the past 10 years has declined by 17,731 since 1995 when membership was 143,633 (a 12% decline).

The plan will look at engaging in the movement through spiritual renewal, active disciple making, education and practical skill training and leader development, with training and resourcing from the General Board of Discipleship (GBOD) in Nashville.

All churches are encouraged to discern the current strengths of their ministry by using the Church Vitality Indicator (CVI) survey developed by the GBOD. **Rev. Rookard** and **Walter King** sent a joint letter and CVI to all Camphor members on January 24th. In addition, emails were sent encouraging members

with Internet access to take the survey online at *www.cvindicator.com* (Camphor ID is 1170168101). The deadline (2/11/07) for return of the CVI has been extended. So far only 16 surveys have been submitted from Camphor.

Rev. Richard Allen -- First Black Methodist Elder

We proudly dedicate this special Black History edition of *The Camphor Light* to Rev. Richard Allen (1760-1831), one of the greatest Black religious leaders in America.

He was born in 1760, a slave of a Quaker lawyer and judge, Hon. Benjamin Chew, in Germantown. At a

young age, he and his family were sold to Stokley Sturgis whose plantation was near Dover, DE. Sturgis permitted Richard and his brothers to attend meetings at the Methodist Society. Richard taught himself to read and write, converted early, joined the Methodist Society of preachers and soon began to lead their meetings. His activity impressed his owner, who allowed Richard and his brothers to purchase their freedom. Richard worked hard at odd jobs, continued his ministry, and converted his owner to the Methodist faith.

After purchasing his freedom, Allen moved back to Philadelphia, where he established himself as a minister. He was ordained at the 1st conference of the Methodist church in North America, in Baltimore, MD in 1784. He

was allowed to hold services at 5 a.m. in the morning. In 1786, he was a preacher at St. George's United Methodist Church in Philadelphia. He preached throughout Philadelphia, New Jersey and Delaware, and it is thought that he attended the first organizing conference of American Methodism. It was during this time that Allen met his future associate, Absalom Jones, who shared the vision of establishing a church for newly freed Blacks.

In 1787, while kneeling in prayer at St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church, Allen, Jones and other black worshipers were pulled from the church by St. George's church officials. As a result of this action, Allen and Jones organized the independent Free African Society, an organization which denounced slavery, and spearheaded the establishment of an "African Church". In 1799, he was the first Black minister ordained by Francis Asbury, and made an elder of the church in 1816. On July 17, 1794. Allen, a Methodist, and Jones, an Episcopalian, opened Bethel Church. Later, on April 9, 1816, Richard Allen unified the two factions by forming the first African Methodist Episcopal Church.. (Sources not included)
